Pointed Pen Possibilities

A Workshop with LeeAnn Clark

A workshop to explore pointed pen possibilities with chief Whitehouse Calligrapher, Lee Ann Clark, was a wonderful opportunity to continue this year's theme of 'pointy tools' and I was happy to be among the participants. In true leadership fashion, Lee Ann guided us through a progression of exercises using a variety of lettering and layout techniques resulting in successful and individually unique calligraphic compositions.

We began using offset nib-holders with a variety of pointed nibs to copy Lee Ann's beautiful, slanted majuscules and minuscules in black ink on smooth transparent layout bond paper. Once we got a grasp of the 'rules', Lee Ann encouraged us to 'flex the rules' by modifying the basics. By altering letters' shapes, ascenders, descenders, slopes and inter-linear spaces, we began to breathe life into them. Our final assignment

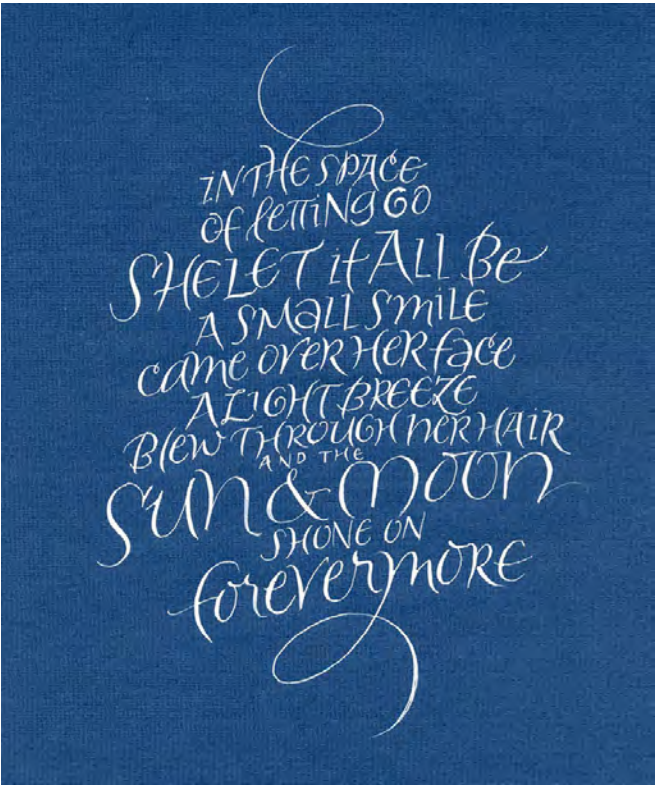
was to write a short text and finished piece employing these lively variations. We used layer after layer of layout bond tracing, revising and refining every detail of our compositions and ultimately creating cohesive and balanced calligraphic designs. The final versions were then placed on transfer paper and carefully traced onto good sheets of colored paper. The finished lettering was written in gouache over the traced images.

Lee Ann's kind encouragement helped each of us overcome our struggles and, most importantly, helped us achieve goals beyond our expectations.

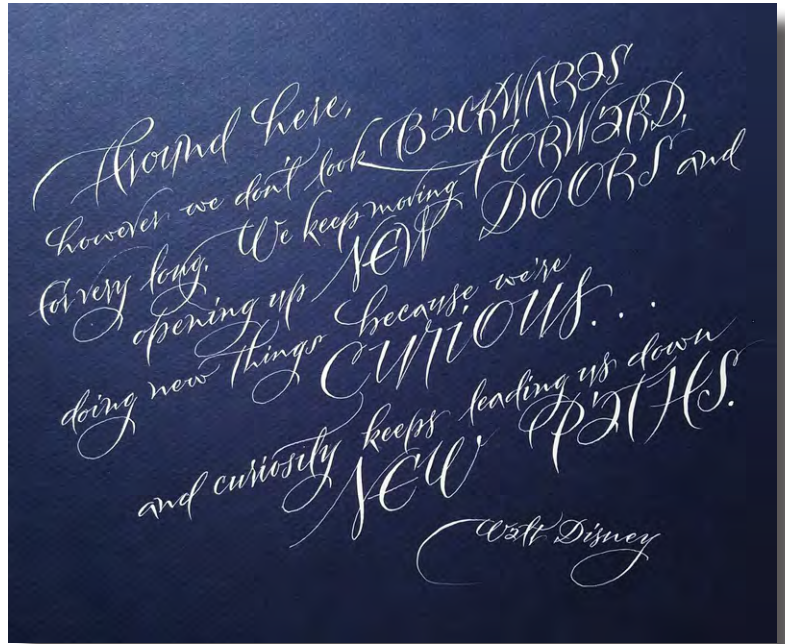
We left happy but exhausted, though, unlike Lee Ann, none of us had to fly back to Washington D.C. on Monday and address a stack of 8,000 envelopes!

Copyright Information

- Before 1923: In the public domain.
- Between 1923 and 1963: copyright never renewed, in public domain.
- Between 1923 and 1963: copyright timely renewed, protected for 95 years from date of first publication.
- Between 1964 and 1977: protected for 95 years from date of first publication.
- 1978 and later, published or not, if author is known: protected for author's lifetime plus 70 years.
- 1978 or later, published or not, works for hire, or if author is anonymous: protected for 95 years from date of first publication or 120 years from the date of creation, whichever ends first.
- If the copyright notice is missing, that does not necessarily indicate that the item is copyright free.
- All right pertaining to works of art, articles, jokes, cartoons, drawings, logos etc., are the sole property of the artist unless arrangements have been made, permission given and/or fees paid.
- The copyright is automatic as soon as anyone creates anything, it is protected. No reproductions of the art for any purpose are allowed without a prior agreement. This extends for 95 years after the artist's death and may be extended by their heirs.
- Using a brief quotation from a longer article is usually fine, as long as you credit the author and publication. Paraphrasing is acceptable.
- Anything that anyone creates, write, draws, publishes, produces, etc., is automatically protected under the copyright laws - no matter who they are or how old they are.
- The laws protect the words and text, but not the idea - so, paraphrasing is an acceptable way to utilize the

- ideas but not infringe on the authors rights under the law.
- Items that are heard or seen often, such as song lyrics, are carefully guarded. Quoting the text can lead to problems.
- Unfortunately, a lot of people copy off poetry and song lyrics and sayings and distribute them without any indication of who the author might be. This does not mean that if there is no name on it that it is in the public domain.
- If it is possible, get permission from the author, artist, creator.
- Even a portion of an article, if it is the meat of the subject, can be a case for copyright infringement. A very short quote may be allowable, if you are careful to list the author and publication information.
- If you are writing a book review, you can quote from the material and this is not considered an infringement.
- You can write or email people written material if it is private-but email material is covered under the law and there could be problems if the material is forwarded to others or to groups.
- Just because you are including some material in your group's newsletter and it is not for sale or wide distribution, does not mean that the laws do not apply.
- The King James version of the Bible is the only version that is copyright free.
